Forman, ND man facing aggravated assault charges



By Steve Urness, NewsDakota Forman, N.D. (KFGO) man has been charged after a teenage boy was lit on fire in Sargent County, ND last week

Sheriff Travis Paeper says it happened at a farm shop early Sunday morning, February 11. His department learned of it later that day. Video of the incident is circulating on social media and the sheriff was able to recover a copy of the video

Paeper says the 15-year-old victim was at a party when a juvenile male sprayed him with brake cleaner. 19-year-old Lance Tyler, of Forman, then used a torch to ignite the victim as the victim ran up a flight of stairs where others at the party put out the flames. The victim received 2nd and 3rd degree burns on his neck, face and

ear.
Tyler was later arrested in Wahpeton. He's charged with felony aggravated assault with a dangerous weapon and reckless endangerment. The bond was set at \$10,000.

Our critical building needs are our critical building needs are not going away. Our school board carefully considered input from staff, students, and residents to propose a plan that prioritizes what our community said were the highest priorities for our build-The district can't proceed with these urgent improvements if voters reject the referendum. Our voters reject the referendum. Our current budget is insufficient to address the full scope of repairs, renovations, and ongoing maintenance. Without the referendum, there's no other funding source. Our infrastructure challenges will worsen, disrupting education and increasing costs for issues that need to be addressed today. The district explored this option. The district explored this option. North Dakota Century Code limits the amount of debt a school can take on. This limit is 10% of the total assessed value of a district property. The total assessed value of Oakes Public School is approximately \$230 million, which equates to a total debt amount of \$23 million. Building a new school would require \$50-\$60 million,

which is not a feasible option for our district and taxpavers. By ad dressing our most critical needs now, we can remove the risk of infrastructure failures that will disinfrastructure failures that will dis-rupt education, reduce the high costs of emergency repairs, and prolong the life of our building so it can be used for many years to

The Primary Residence Credit
(PRC) was established during (PRC) was established during the 2023 Legislative Session. The credit provides all North Dakota homeowners with the option to apply for a state property tax credit through the North Dakota Office of State Tax Commissioner. Homeowners with an approved application may receive up to a \$500 credit against their 2024 and 2025 property tax obligation. There are no age restrictions or income limitations for this credit. Only one Primary Residence Credit is available per household.




